Year-End Celebrations

With the school year quickly coming to a close, many of us in a regular school year would be starting to plan our end of the year activities for our students. However, in these unprecedented times, everything is different. So it is important to ask ourselves, "How do I want my students to remember the end of this year with me?" This year, more than ever, our students need fun, uplifting activities to round out their year.

Consider building in choice when considering end of the year activities and be mindful of how students are able to become involved in year end activities. As well consider how certain activities might make children feel.

Here are some examples of activities that might support you in creating, for your students, a wonderful end to this school year.

Say goodbye in a way that lets your students know you really saw them, even if it was only for a little while.

Write a Letter To Your Students.

Consider writing your students a heartfelt letter which will become an important keepsake for them; especially this year. You might consider including a self-addressed stamped envelope and an invitation to write back to you.

Write a Letter to Your Future Self.

Depending on the age of your students, students may wish to write a letter to their future selves. Students could write about their goals, predictions, family, expectations, etc. Teachers, you may consider adding a digital twist in the project. Have students email their letters to you. You could immediately forward their letters back to them but schedule the letters to be delivered one year from now. End of the Year Fun and Games. Create an end of the year game to play virtually with students such as Bingo, Jeopardy or Family Feud, or try a digital Breakout game. Host a "Come as Your Future Self Party" and have students come to a Google Meet or Zoom party dressed as their future selves. Students can chat with other students about their future dreams. Or, invite your students to take part in a TikTok dance challenge, create a new dance and post it on Flipgrid or another video platform. Have students learn the same dance, and record themselves completing the challenge.

Celebrate kindness. Make the focus of your final week to commit random acts of kindness, and celebrate them as a group. The givers will get as much of a lift as the receivers.

Share a book. Consider sharing with your students a book that speaks to your wishes for them as they continue on to the summer. 'I Wish You More' is a they would like it to be delivered to them; perhaps a year, two years or more. Find letter suggestions here.

Spend time together. Host a final one-to-one online check-in with each student and their family members. Use this as a time to share the best of what each child brought into your life and your classroom this year.

Plan a Virtual Oscar's Event Roll out the virtual red carpet and have students help you plan the culminating event. Imagine an Oscar's type event. Students could even dress up. You might give awards for such things as the year's best book, a memorable special day, a hilarious classroom moment or other ideas. Some students may want to offer Oscar-style acceptance speeches.
