
Stay the Course

Over the past several years as a Division, Holy Spirit has been focusing our learning and growth as educators primarily in these three areas: Creating Cultures of Thinking and the work of Ron Ritchhart, exploring the Student Competencies and their importance in the lives of our students as we prepare them for life after high school, as well as focusing on Teaching for Conceptual Understanding in order to support learning that transfers to new, real-world problems outside of the classroom.

As we prepare for new curriculum, as well as striving to prepare our students for unlimited possibilities beyond graduation, we continue to target the 'sweet spot' where each of these ideas and understandings intersect in order to support the growth and development of all of our students. What are those commonalities?

- The 'Residuals of Education,' as coined by Ritchhart, are those things that we want to 'stick' with our students long after they graduate (the Student Competencies!)
- · Student engagement and ownership for learning
- · Growth Mindset
- · Authentic learning and learning that transfers

As educators we continue to have many challenges ahead of us, but all of the above help to hit that 'sweet' spot. We can use ALL of these understandings and approaches to tackle ANY content and help prepare our students to be ready for their future, whatever that may look like.
